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Introduction

OhioHealth is a nationally recognized, not-for-profit, system of faith-based hospitals and healthcare organizations serving 50 Ohio counties. All OhioHealth entities are connected by the following: (a) a mission to “improve the health of those we serve”; (b) core values of compassion, excellence, stewardship, integrity, and inclusion; (c) cardinal value of “we honor the dignity and worth of each person”. OhioHealth’s vision is “to provide exceptional care for all through experiences that earn a lifetime of trust”. **Table 1** shows the 16 OhioHealth member hospitals that are in 12 Ohio counties and serves patients residing in at least 50 of the 88 counties in Ohio.

OhioHealth has been known nationally for its world-class healthcare services. OhioHealth has been recognized by Fortune as one of the “100 Best Companies to Work For” from 2007 – 2021. (OhioHealth, 2015-2025). Great Place to Work® and PEOPLE magazine have honored OhioHealth as one of the 2021 PEOPLE Companies that Care® (OhioHealth, 2015-2025). In 2020, four OhioHealth hospitals, namely, Riverside Methodist Hospital, Grant Medical Center, Doctors Hospital and Dublin Methodist Hospital were named a 2020 LGBTQ Healthcare Equality Top Performer based on the 2020 Healthcare Equality Index (HEI) administered by the Human Rights Campaign (HRC). In 2020, OhioHealth was recognized as Great Place to Work – Certified™ based on the Great Place to Work® Trust Index™ survey.

In February 2021, the OhioHealth Inclusion Pledge was adopted throughout the health system. Each OhioHealth employee becomes a part of a culture that cares; one that supports one another; and honors the dignity and worth of each person. OhioHealth is committed to ensuring that the organization reflects the rich diversity of the communities we serve. We respect, embrace, and derive strength from the ways that we are similar and the ways that we are different.

OhioHealth is dedicated to serving communities through its Community Benefit. In Fiscal Year 2023, OhioHealth provided a total \$468 million in Community Benefit, including \$107.7 million in charity care, \$254.7 million in net cost of Medicaid programs, \$67.2 million in net cost of medical education, \$0.9 million in subsidized health services, \$10.8 million toward community health services, \$25.7 million in cash and in-kind contributions, and \$1 million for research.

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital is a 59-bed hospital that builds on the tradition of quality, people- and community-centered care, programs, services, education, and outreach in Delaware County, Ohio. Recent advances are ongoing at the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital:

- New surgery suites with four operating rooms and 16 private perioperative bays for efficiency and comfort before and after surgery, which also features continuous care from a dedicated nurse.
- Interior renovations to create 21 private patient rooms.
- New family waiting room with wireless workstations.
- Renovated Intensive Care Unit (ICU), waiting room and food service areas.

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital received various awards, recognitions, and accreditations, related to excellent quality of patient care and use of technology to further improve patient care services.

- a. **Accreditation by The Joint Commission** – The OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital, together with additional sites, including the OhioHealth Delaware Health Center, and Lewis Center Health Center are accredited by The Joint Commission. See **Table 2** for a summary of services that are accredited by the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital.

- b. Certification by the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer** – The OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital is accredited as a Community Cancer Program (American College of Surgeons, 1996-2024).
- c. American College of Radiology™ Accreditation** – The OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital is accredited by the American College of Radiology™ for computed tomography (CT), magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), nuclear medicine, and ultrasound. The American College of Radiology™ is the gold standard in medical imaging. Accreditation signifies that the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital (a) met high standards for safety and quality in medical imaging or radiation oncology treatment; (b) has systems that ensure the appropriate dose levels for children and adult imaging; (c) met the standards in imaging and quality control; and (d) met rigorous review process (American College of Radiology™, n.d.).
- d. Lifeline of Ohio “Champion” Honors Legacies Through Organ Donation** – In 2024, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital was recognized by Lifeline of Ohio as a “Donor Hospital Champion” through its efforts to develop a systematic process for donation of organ, tissue, and eye that ensures preparations and necessary steps of the unit, family, and staff in case a patient is assessed as a potential donor (OhioHealth, 2025).

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 requires not-for-profit hospitals to conduct a community health needs assessment once every three years (Internal Revenue Service, 2024). OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital developed the Fiscal Year 2026–2028 Implementation Strategy, in collaboration with the Delaware Public Health District and various community stakeholders. OhioHealth’s strong and sustainable partnerships demonstrate continuing commitment to play active and effective roles in the Delaware County community by fulfilling OhioHealth’s mission of “to improve the health of those we serve.” Moreover, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital’s Fiscal Years 2026-2028 Implementation Strategy will include actions and strategies that align with Ohio’s 2020–2022 State Health Improvement Plan (Ohio Department of Health, n.d.).

A. Definition of the Community Served by the Hospital Facility

A – 1. Location of hospitals and ZIP codes of communities served.

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital is located at 561 W. Central Avenue, Delaware, Ohio 43015.

The “community served” by the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital is Delaware County, Ohio based on the percent of patients served from Delaware County. See **Section A – 2**. The communities reside in zip codes 43003; 43015; 43021; 43032; 43035; 43061; 43065; 43066; 43074; 43082; 43240 (Datasheer, LLC, 2003-2024).

A – 2. Percent of patients served by OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital from Delaware County.

Table 3 shows the percent of inpatients, outpatients, Emergency Department, observation, surgeries, and births from Delaware County residents during Fiscal Year 2022 (7/1/2021 to 6/30/2022) and Fiscal Year 2023 (7/1/2022 to 6/30/2023). On average, patients from Guernsey County comprised 69% and 73% of patients served by OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital in Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023, respectively. These data demonstrated that Delaware County is the “community served” by the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital.

C. Existing Healthcare Facilities and Resources within the Community That Are Available to Respond to the Health Needs of the Community

C – 1. Healthcare Facilities and Community Resources Addressing Significant Health Needs Related to Mental Health and Addiction

- C – 1.1. OhioHealth’s Behavioral Health Services** – OhioHealth offers inpatient, outpatient, and behavioral health resources (OhioHealth, 2015-2025). Services include (a) inpatient care, (b) electroconvulsive therapy (ECT), (c) psychiatric emergency services, and (d) inpatient consultation/liaison services (OhioHealth, 2015-2025).

The **OhioHealth Inpatient Behavioral Health Services** are available at three locations, namely:

- **OhioHealth Mansfield Hospital Behavioral Health** – located at 335 Glessner Avenue, Mansfield, Ohio 44903. Services include intensive outpatient program and Employee Assistance Program (OhioHealth, 2015-2025).
- **OhioHealth Marion General Hospital Behavioral Health** – located at 1000 McKinley Park Drive, Marion, Ohio 43302.
- **OhioHealth Riverside Methodist Hospital Behavioral Health** – located at 3535 Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214.

The **OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Services** offers (a) Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP); (b) Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP); (c) Behavioral Health Outpatient Consultation/Transition Services; (d) Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction Program (MBSR); and (e) Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation (TMS) (OhioHealth 2015-2025).

- **OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Offices Central Ohio** – located at 3820 Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214.
- **OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health** – located at 5141 West Broad Street, Suite 115, Columbus, Ohio 43228.
- **OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health Columbus Dublin Granville Road** – located at 5150 E. Dublin Granville Road, Suite 250, Columbus, Ohio 43081.
- **OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health Columbus West Lane Avenue Suite 230** – located at 1480 West Lane Avenue, Suite 230, Columbus, Ohio 43211.

C – 2. Healthcare Facilities and Community Resources Addressing Significant Health Needs Related to Community Conditions

C – 2.1. Delaware County Department of Job and Family Services – The Delaware County Department of Job and Family Services is funded by federal, state, and local government to serve people facing difficulties in managing their monthly living expenses, healthcare, family-related issues, job skills, obtaining employment and retaining employment (Delaware County, Ohio, n.d.).

- **Access to services of the Public Assistance Division** – assists with provision of food, health, insurance, and money. The Public Assistance Division helps clients with obtaining access to Medicaid, cash assistance for limited period, and food through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) that is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
 - **SNAP** –helps low-income persons and families purchase healthy foods. SNAP helps supplement a person’s grocery budget, access nutritious foods and meals, and hoping that clients will attain health and wellbeing.
 - **Cash assistance from Ohio Works First** – part of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families for up to 3 years of assistance. Refugees of the United States are able to avail of financial help for 1 year through the Refugee Cash Assistance program.
 - **Childcare and Education Services** – assists families who are working or who are in school to avail of assistance to pay for childcare and other education services. Funding is provided through the Publicly Funded Childcare (PFCC) and the Early Childhood Education grant.
 - **Medicaid health insurance** – access to health care coverage for income eligible individuals and families, children, pregnant women, seniors, and people with disabilities.
 - **Housing, Rental, and Utility Resources** – helps persons and families with affordable and accessible rental housing, linkage to community resources that aids with housing, rental assistance, and homebuying.
- **Access to Veterans Benefits** – available to US citizens and their spouses who served in the U.S. military. Benefits are administered by the Ohio Department of Veterans Services.

C – 2.2. BRIDGES Community Action Partnership – The BRIDGES Community Action Partnership’s mission is “empowers people in need by partnering with them to better their lives and realize personal prosperity”. BRIDGES serves 6 Ohio Counties, Champaign, Delaware, Logan, Madison, Shelby, and Union Counties. In Delaware County, the BRIDGES office is located at 555 Sunbury Road, Delaware, Ohio 43015 (BRIDGES Community Action Partnership, n.d.). Examples of services include:

- **Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP)** – includes winter and summer crisis programs. The HEAP gives assistance to low-income Ohioans with one-time payment to help them with costs of heating and cooling their homes. To be eligible, the total household income should be equal or less than 175% of federal poverty guidelines.
- **Home Weatherization Assistance Program (HWAP)** – provides free weatherization and energy-saving services as interventions to reduce energy costs of low-income residents. Examples of services include (a) inspection of homes for energy efficiency and safety; (b) insulation placement; (b) lower air leakage in the home; and (c) furnace repair or replacement. Eligible persons must have a total household income at or below 200% of federal poverty level.
- **Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) Plus** – makes monthly gas and/or electric utility bills more affordable 12 months of the year for low-income households. Low-income households pay a reduced rate based on household income percent. Eligible persons must have total household income at or below 175% of federal poverty guidelines.

- **The Electric Partnership Program** – assists with reducing electricity consumption at home among income-eligible persons. Persons who avail of this benefit have household income below 175% of federal poverty guidelines.
- **Water Utility Assistance Program** – benefits people who are unable to pay their water bill. The program gives low-income households with one-time emergency payment of up to \$150 to prevent disconnection or to serve as deposits for water bills. Persons who benefit from WRAP have household income less than or equal to 125% of federal poverty.
- **Work-Related Assistance Program (WRAP)** – provides low-income persons with means to succeed in work, including: (a) purchases of interview clothes, work clothes, boots, uniforms; (b) assistance with transportation; (c) fees for training; (d) other work-related expenses; (e) covering costs for GED exams; and (f) writing resumes, searching for jobs, and preparing for interviews. Persons who benefit from WRAP have household income less than or equal to 125% of federal poverty.
- **Financial Empowerment** – helps clients improve their financial wellbeing through: (a) gaining knowledge and money decision making; (b) skills building related to making decisions around money; (c) developing confidence to make good money decisions. Volunteers help clients with the following: (a) preparing tax papers; (b) saving money to use in purchase of assets; (c) education in managing debt, and budgeting; and (d) understand financial challenges and use tools to improve problem areas. People eligible for the Financial Empowerment program must have income below 200% of federal poverty level.
- **Access to Workshop “Getting Ahead in a Just Getting’ by World”** – help clients experiencing poverty to understand their lives, communities, and develop means of building resources and make plans for obtaining resources. The client is encouraged to look at old problems and find new solutions to attain economic mobility for oneself and for the group (BRIDGES Community Action Partnership, 2023). Examples of skills that will be learned by clients include:
 - Characterize poverty in the local community and assess how it affects people in the community.
 - Understand and research the gap between the rich and the poor and the causes of poverty.
 - Understand that poverty is more than individual’s choices.
 - Discover the rules of economic class; wealthy, middle class, and poor.
 - To get ahead, a person needs to know the rules.
 - Recognize how people say things to others influence relationships at home, social situations, and work lives.
 - Assess oneself in comparison with high quality life.
 - Recognize how the theory of change gives us freedom from being stuck in addressing the same problems of the past.
 - Based on new information and time to reflect, a person will be able to find solutions.
 - Develop skills in budgeting and improving financial status.
 - Develop a personal plan that involves “personal future story”, building one’s strengths, and gain resources needed to prosper.

C – 2.3. Delaware Metropolitan Housing Authority – The Delaware Metropolitan Housing Authority is responsible for administering subsidized housing that are funded by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Delaware Metropolitan Housing Authority is located at 222 Curtis Street, Delaware, Ohio 43015 (Delaware Metropolitan Housing Authority, n.d.).

- **Housing Choice Voucher Program** – assists low-income families, elderly, and disabled to afford decent, safe and sanitary housing in the private market. Participants are able to identify their own housing, such as single-family homes, townhouses and apartments. A housing subsidy is paid to the landlord directly by Delaware Metropolitan Housing Authority. Access to the housing voucher is limited to U.S. citizens and legal permanent residents. The family's income must not exceed 50% of the median income for Delaware County. Total of 75% of the vouchers are provided to applicants whose income is less than or equal to 30% of the median income. When a family is determined as eligible for the Housing Choice Voucher program, they will be placed in the waiting list until served. Long waiting periods are common since people needing housing assistance is greater than the available number of vouchers.

C – 2.4. United Way of Delaware County – implements various programs that supports families, youth, and young children.

- **United Way of Delaware County's Strengthening Families Program** – funded by Honda to enable "Strengthening Delaware County One Family at a Time". The United Way of Delaware County Family Resource Center offers access to resources, basic needs, empowerment, and hope. Examples of initiatives of the Strengthening Families Program include:
 - **Access to Emergency Crisis Pantry** – gives free shelf-stable food, personal hygiene products, and household supplies without need for documentation.
 - **Access to Community Resources and Referral** – supports patrons with access to community resources and referrals to United Way of Delaware County partners.
 - **Delaware County Diaper Bank** – distributes emergency supply of diapers (newborn to adult size), pullups, diaper creams and wipes once a month. The diaper distribution centers include: (a) Buckeye Valley Food Pantry; (b) Feed Delaware / Vineyard; (c) Sharing is Caring; (d) Common Ground Free Store; (e) Liberty Community Center; (f) Sunbury Diaper Resources at Big Walnut Friends who Share; (g) United Way Resource Center in Willis Education Center; (h) People In Need; and (i) Unity Community Center. Details on addresses, schedules of diaper distribution of these food pantry or resource centers are available in United Way of Delaware County, Ohio (2021).

As part of the Strengthening Families Program, United Way of Delaware County's partner agencies (United Way of Delaware County, Ohio, 2024) include:

- **Common Ground Free Store** – provides clothes and household items to families.
- **Delaware Speech and Hearing Center** – provides speech language and audio pathology services.
- **Family Promise of Delaware County** – assists families who leaves the homeless shelter.
- **Grace Clinic** – offers access to healthcare to unemployed and underemployed persons without health insurance.
- **HelpLine of Delaware and Morrow Counties** – offers information and referral services to people experiencing mental health or life crisis.
- **Liberty Community Center** – offers early childhood education plan for Delaware County's children at risk.
- **People in Need** – offers Mortgage Assistance Program to people facing financial problems.

- **Salvation Army in Central Ohio (Delaware location)** – aims to prevent homelessness and enables access to supportive housing.
- **Salvation Army in Central Ohio (Salvation Army/Central Ohio Reach and Restore Coalition)** – facilitates crisis response to human trafficking victims.
- **Turning Point** – supports victims of domestic violence through support, access to shelter, and advocacy.
- **United Way of Delaware County’s TreeHouse Young Adult Transitional Living Program** – located at 104 Oak Hill Avenue, Delaware, Ohio 43015. The TreeHouse Young Adult Transitional Living Program addresses housing needs for young adults ages 18 to 24 years. The young adults have faced multiple challenges in their daily life, such as but not limited to: (a) aged out of foster care or (b) faced difficulties living with caregivers who may suffer from addiction or acts violently.; (c) lack home resources; and (d) identifies with the LGBTQ+ community. Among these young adults, the lack of dependable housing limits their abilities to find employment, attend to school regularly and unable to demonstrate skills for independent living. To assist in providing young adults with stable home, the United Way of Delaware County purchased a home close to Ohio Wesleyan University, downtown Delaware, and United Way of Delaware County’s Strengthening Families hub to provide comprehensive resources to these young adults. This young adult transitional housing is staffed 24/7 by case managers who will support young adults from transition to independent housing (United Way of Delaware County, Ohio, 2024).
- **United Way of Delaware County’s Virtual Backpack** – The United Way of Delaware County provides school supplies and backpack to school children from kindergarten to 12th grade. Apart from traditional students, the Virtual Backpack program also serves children who are home schooled and students with disabilities.
- **United Way of Delaware County’s “Delaware County Against Human Trafficking Coalition”** – a project led by United Way of Delaware County to provide “a coordinated community response to end human trafficking through advocacy, education, prevention, and ongoing comprehensive services (United Way of Delaware County, Ohio, 2024).
- **United Way of Delaware County’s “Delaware County Hunger Alliance”** –
 - **Andrews House** – host the Farmers’ Market Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).
 - **FEED Delaware** – food pantry at the Delaware City Vineyard Church.
 - **Grace Clinic** – prescription produce program.
 - **Lutheran Social Services of Central Ohio** – hosts balanced meals to Delaware County families facing food insecurity.
 - **Ohio Wesleyan University’s Department of Health and Human Kinetics** – offers nutritious cooking classes to the community.
 - **People in Need** – offers food pantry.
 - **Salvation Army in Central Ohio (Delaware location)** – offers food pantry.
 - **SourcePoint** – facilitates meals delivered to homebound residents under age 55.

C – 2.5. Delaware County Regional Planning Commission – The mission of the Delaware County Regional Planning Commission is “to provide growth management systems, planning services and general information to all governmental entities in Delaware County, Ohio relating to land use planning and coordination of activities of regional significance”. The Delaware County Regional Planning Commission serves as the authority for subdivision platting unincorporated areas. It collaborates with local communities and county agencies to ensure development occurs in accordance with the Subdivision Regulations, local zoning, and other plans. The Delaware County Regional Planning Commission collaborates with the County Engineer, Sanitary Engineer, Soil and Water Conservation District, Building Safety, Health District, and other utilities to fulfill its mission.

C – 2.6. Turning Point – serves domestic violence victims and their families who reside in Crawford, Delaware, Marion, Morrow, Union, and Wyandot Counties. Turning Point offers free and confidential services to domestic violence victims including victims of federal crimes (Turning Point, n.d.). It is a Safe Zone for all, including people from the LGBTQ+ community, those with Limited English Proficiency/Deaf/Hard of Hearing (Turning. Examples of programs and services include:

- Access to basic needs, including shelter, food, transportation, transitional housing.
- Access to education and support for individuals and groups, advocacy for domestic violence victim's rights, information, and referral, 24-hour Crisis Line, community education and outreach, and advocacy for teens.

C – 3. Healthcare Facilities and Community Resources Addressing Significant Health Needs Related to Access to Care

C – 3.1. OhioHealth Cancer Care programs and services – OhioHealth's CancerCall gives access to a cancer specialist at 1-800-752-9119 that answer questions and connect to cancer physicians, programs, and services. The CancerCall is available Monday to Friday, 8 AM to 5 PM. Examples of OhioHealth's cancer interventions and conditions treated include (a) blood and marrow transplant and cellular therapy; (b) breast cancer; (c) cancer rehabilitation; (d) cardio-oncology; (e) colorectal cancer; (f) gastrointestinal surgical oncology; (g) gynecologic cancer; (h) interventional radiology; (i) lung cancer; (j) medical oncology; (k) precision medicine; (l) prostate cancer; (m) radiation oncology; (n) skin cancer; and (o) survivorship, supportive, and integrative care.

C – 3.2. OhioHealth Emergency and Trauma programs and services – OhioHealth offers 22 emergency care locations and four trauma centers in central Ohio. Emergency Care services provide immediate, expert treatment for severe and life-threatening conditions. Examples of emergency conditions include: (a) abdominal pain or injury; (b) blood pressure problems; (c) blood sugar concerns; (d) chest pain or injury; (e) blood clot; (f) confusion or changes in mental function, unexplained drowsiness, and disorientation; (g) cough up blood; (h) dehydration; (i) difficulty breathing or shortness of breath due to asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), or heart failure; (j) eye pain with sudden visual changes; (k) fainting or passing out; (l) head pain; (m) sudden onset or change in headache or migraine pattern; (n) heart beating fast or irregular heart beat; (o) kidney stones; (p) light-headedness; (q) limb swelling without injury; (r) major animal bite; (s) major burns; (t) major cuts; (u) emergencies during pregnancy; (v) rectal bleeding; (w) allergic reaction; (x) sexual assault; (y) suicidal thoughts; and (z) uncontrolled bleeding.

C – 3.3. OhioHealth Urgent Care – provide medical services for non-life-threatening conditions. Examples of conditions that are appropriate for urgent care include: (a) animal and insect bites and stings; (b) asthma Flare-up (wheezing, not improving with inhalers, no difficulty breathing); (c) cold, flu or COVID-19 symptoms (body ache, congestion, cough, fever, sinus infection, sore throat); (d) cuts, bruises or may need stitches; (e) earache and infection; (f) Injuries (possible broken bones, sprains, dislocations); (g) minor allergic reactions; (h) minor burns; (i) nausea, vomiting or diarrhea without bleeding, abdominal pain or dehydration; (j) minor nosebleeds; (k) pink eye, red eye, itching; (l) rashes; (m) sexually transmitted infections with symptoms; (n) sprains and strains; (o) suture/staple removal; (p) urinary; (q) kidney and bladder infections; and (r) wound check (Increased pain, tenderness, redness, swelling or warmth around the cut or injury, fever, or other changes).

C – 3.4. Continue to offer the OhioHealth Heart and Vascular care and services – Continue to offer various heart and vascular programs at OhioHealth Marion General Hospital, such as but not limited to:

- Cardiac imaging.
- Cardiac rehabilitation.
- Cardiothoracic surgery.
- Clinical cardiology.
- Electrophysiology.
- Heart failure clinics.
- Cardiovascular disease prevention, including lifestyle programs such as fitness, nutrition counseling, tobacco cessation, weight management, stress management, and health risk management.
- Clinical prevention modalities, including anticoagulation clinics, and lipid clinics.
- OhioHealth Heart and Vascular outreach and community partnerships.

C – 3.4.1. OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital's Heart and Vascular services include but not limited to:

- **OhioHealth Heart and Vascular Cardiac Rehabilitation** – located at 561 W Central Avenue, Ground Floor, Delaware, Ohio 43015 (OhioHealth, 2015-2025). The OhioHealth Cardiac Rehabilitation team helps patients who were affected with: (a) heart attack/myocardial infarction; (b) acute coronary syndrome; (c) chronic stable angina; (d) recent cardiac procedure such as angioplasty or stent; (e) Coronary Artery Bypass Grafting (CABG) surgery; (f) heart valve surgery; and (g) heart failure. OhioHealth offers the following services: OhioHealth's experienced team of clinical cardiac rehabilitation specialists teaches patients on how to make changes in lifestyle and behavior to improve one's heart health.

An example of a cardiac rehabilitation program at OhioHealth includes (a) nutrition planning; (b) supervised exercise program; (c) tobacco cessation program; (d) medical weight management; (e) heart disease prevention clinics; (f) support groups; and (g) lifestyle, behavior, and health responsibility coaching.

- **OhioHealth cardiac imaging tests** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. Cardiac imaging gives physicians an inside view of the heart and vascular system. Cardiac imaging helps physicians evaluate the structure, function, or damage to the heart, as well as plan and guide catheter-based procedures. Using the images gathered from the tests, our cardiac imaging physicians work together with our other cardiovascular experts to make an accurate diagnosis and determine the best treatment for you. OhioHealth uses advanced cardiac imaging interventions such as:
 - **Cardiovascular Magnetic Resonance Imaging (CVMR)** – an advanced, noninvasive cardiac imaging technique that produces high quality, detailed images that help determine your diagnosis and treatment. CVMR is an advanced imaging used to analyze the structure of the heart.
 - **Calcium Coronary Scoring** – an advanced, low radiation heart imaging for people older than age 40. The heart scan screens for early plaque in arteries. Calcium Coronary Scoring is useful for patients with a family history of heart disease or at risk for heart disease, especially those patients with high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, and other diseases or behaviors that lead to heart disease).

- **Cardiac Positron Emission Tomography (Cardiac PET)** – an advanced, noninvasive test that provides detailed images of the heart and associated blood flow. Cardiac PET is used to diagnose coronary artery disease and detect areas of low blood flow in the heart. The Cardiac PET assesses heart function and damage after a heart event. As part of the test, a small amount of radioactive solution is injected into the blood stream and a heart scan is taken. OhioHealth physicians use these highly detailed images of the heart and blood flow.
- **Cardiovascular Computed Tomography Angiography (CCTA)** – aims to determine abnormalities in blood flow, abnormality of the arteries due to plaque buildup, and overall function of the heart. Plaque buildup may be due to accumulation of fat, cholesterol, and calcium.
- **Echocardiogram** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. Echocardiogram uses sound waves to create pictures of the heart. Echocardiogram shows the image of the heart while it is beating and shows image of the heart valves and other structures. It is more commonly called Transthoracic echocardiogram (Medline Plus, 2023).
- **Electrocardiogram** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. Electrocardiogram can determine the following: (a) how fast your heart is beating; (b) steady or irregular rhythm of the heartbeat; and (c) strength and timing of electrical signals passing through each part of the heart.
- **Exercise and nuclear stress testing** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. Exercise and nuclear stress testing takes pictures of the heart while a patient is exercising. A patient is injected with a tracer, which is a radioactive substance.
- **Nuclear imaging** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. Nuclear imaging uses a small amount of radioactive material to create detailed pictures of the heart.
- **Transesophageal echocardiogram (TEE)** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. TEE is a probe with an ultrasound transducer is inserted into the throat. TEE can determine inflammation of the heart, blood clots, and other abnormal structures.
- **Cardiovascular diagnostic testing** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. Cardiovascular diagnostic testing involves blood tests and imaging to determine blood flow, heart rhythm, heart valves and chambers, and presence of tumors or heart structure abnormalities.
- **Cardiothoracic surgery** – provided by the OhioHealth Physician Group Heart and Vascular Clinic at the Grady Memorial Hospital campus. It is located at 551 W. Central Avenue, Suite 204, Delaware, Ohio 43015. OhioHealth's cardiothoracic surgeons perform heart surgeries such as but not limited to: (a) Coronary Artery Bypass Grafts (CABG; bypass surgery); (b) mitral and aortic valve repair and replacement; (c) surgical ablation for atrial fibrillation; (d) atrial and ventricular septal defect repairs; (e) thoracic aneurysm repair; (f) aortic reconstruction with endovascular and open techniques; and (g) left ventricular assist device (LVAD) implantation.

C – 3.4.2. OhioHealth’s Heart and Vascular Clinics are available at other locations in neighboring Counties. Examples of heart and vascular programs and services include but not limited to:

- **Clinical Cardiology (Sports Cardiology)** – It has been recognized that an underlying heart condition can stop athletes in their tracks and could even be fatal. Typically caused by a rhythm disturbance, a structural abnormality or a problem with coronary arteries, these conditions may not cause any symptoms before a significant heart event occurs. OhioHealth offers heart screenings for student athletes, active teens and adults, to evaluate for underlying heart conditions that could put them at risk while competing or training. The assessment can be performed beginning at age 14. The screening is non-invasive and involves two simple heart tests: (a) electrocardiogram (EKG); and (b) focused echocardiogram (a painless ultrasound of the heart). OhioHealth’s sports cardiologists will evaluate and interpret the test results and then mail the participant a written report within two business days. Most importantly, OhioHealth’s sports cardiologists will also share results with the designated primary care physician or pediatrician.
- **Clinical Cardiology (Cardio-Oncology)** – OhioHealth’s cardiologists prevention, early detection and prompt treatment of side effects of cancer treatments. OhioHealth’s dedicated team of cardiologists works closely with patient’s oncologists to help prevent, detect and treat possible cardiac side effects related to cancer treatments. Additionally, OhioHealth cardiologists’ trusted experience in managing pre-existing cardiac conditions and optimizing cardiovascular risks in patients undergoing cancer treatment.
- **Heart and Vascular Electrophysiology** – OhioHealth’s electrophysiologists customize treatment to unique and complex needs of patients with abnormal heart rhythms (arrhythmias or dysrhythmias). Natural electrical impulses in the body cause contractions in the heart to keep blood flow. In some patients, heart rhythm can get out of sync causing a myriad of symptoms from dizziness and fainting to blood clots and strokes. OhioHealth’s cardiologists are experts at diagnosing heart rhythm disorders and often collaborate with OhioHealth’s heart failure specialists, Cardiovascular surgeons identify the most appropriate treatment for specific heart concerns. Treatments for arrhythmia disorders are often complex requiring a combination of drugs and interventions and different for each patient.

OhioHealth treats various heart rhythm conditions, such as but not limited to:

- Atrial fibrillation.
- Bradyarrhythmia (slow heart rate).
- Heart failure (cardiac resynchronization devices).
- Supraventricular tachycardia.
- Ventricular tachycardia and fibrillation.
- Premature ventricular contractions (PVC).

OhioHealth’s electrophysiology treatments treat heart rhythms through various interventions, such as but not limited to:

- **New Cardiac Mapping Technology** – OhioHealth’s electrophysiologists were among the first in the state to begin using cardiac mapping for more accurate diagnosis and successful treatment of complex cardiac arrhythmias. The system generates a 3D map of the heart’s electrical function that helps physicians more precisely target the areas that need to be ablated.
- **Ablation** – Catheter ablation is a minimally invasive technique used to eliminate the abnormal heart tissue responsible for an arrhythmia. Using advanced imaging and a tiny incision, a catheter is threaded through blood vessels to the heart to deliver ablation energy to eliminate the heart tissue responsible for the arrhythmia.

- **Implanted devices** – OhioHealth has vast experience implanting and managing cardiac devices. Access to a wide array of cardiac pacemakers, biventricular pacemakers, cardiac defibrillators, and arrhythmia monitoring devices allows us to provide the right treatment for your specific condition. After patient's receive their implanted devices, OhioHealth provide regular monitoring and evaluation in our outpatient device clinics to ensure the device is functioning optimally.
- **Atrial Fibrillation (AFib) Clinic** – At the OhioHealth Atrial Fibrillation Clinic, located in the OhioHealth Advanced Heart and Vascular Center at Riverside Methodist Hospital, OhioHealth's providers are experts at identifying and correcting heart rhythm disorders. These include atrial fibrillation and caring for patients experiencing acute episodes of atrial fibrillation that request immediate evaluation or support. OhioHealth's Atrial Fibrillation (AFib) clinic may be reached at (614) 788-AFIB (2342).
- **Other Interventions** – include (a) comprehensive diagnostic electrical studies; (b) left atrial appendage closure as an alternative to anticoagulant therapy; and (c) non-invasive cardioversion procedures and tilt-table tests. Tilt-table tests determines how the body reacts to position changes to determine root causes of dizziness and fainting.
- **Heart Failure** – Heart failure progresses over time. As your heart muscle weakens, it no longer has the strength to pump oxygen-rich blood through your body. It can lead to fatigue and shortness of breath, swelling, and kidney and liver damage. OhioHealth's heart failure specialists help patient manage heart failure by minimizing symptoms and prolonging life.
- **Interventional Cardiology** – OhioHealth's interventional cardiologists are highly skilled at using small catheters, advanced imaging and tiny incisions to treat many conditions. These minimally invasive treatments lead to a quicker recovery, shorter hospital stays, better survival and improved quality of life for our patients. Some of the conditions we treat include: (a) myocardial infarction (heart attack); (b) coronary artery disease; (c) coronary artery chronic total occlusion (CTO); (d) structural heart/heart valve diseases; (e) heart failure; (f) vascular and peripheral vascular disease, including abdominal aortic aneurysm (AAA), (g) carotid artery disease; and (h) peripheral artery disease (PAD).
- **Structural Heart** – Age, injury or infection can alter the precise function of your heart. Our team of interventional cardiologists and surgeons take an equally precise approach to repair the damage and restore your health helps patients make a faster return to everyday life. OhioHealth structural heart specialists treat various conditions such as but not limited to: (a) aortic stenosis; (b) aortic regurgitation; (c) chronic total occlusion; (d) hypertrophic obstructive cardiomyopathy; (e) left atrial appendage occlusion; (f) mitral regurgitation; (g) mitral stenosis; and (h) tricuspid regurgitation.
- **Vascular Disease** – The vascular system carries blood throughout the entire body, requiring a comprehensive approach to treating vascular disease. That is why our vascular team includes experts from five different specialties who collaborate to treat these complex conditions, including aortic aneurysms, carotid artery disease, venous disease and peripheral artery disease. By using a whole-body approach when evaluating and treating patients with vascular conditions, our patients have improved outcomes, even when it comes to the most difficult cases.

The vascular conditions (OhioHealth 2015-2025) that the healthcare team include but not limited to:

- **Buerger's Disease** – also called “thromboangitis obliterans”. This rare disease affects arteries and veins in the arms and legs. Buerger's Disease causes blood vessels to become inflamed, swollen and blocked with blood clots, which eventually damages or destroys skin tissues. Virtually everyone diagnosed with Buerger's disease smokes or uses tobacco in other forms.
- **Leg swelling** – Leg swelling, or edema, is a common condition that happens when fluid collects in small spaces around the tissues and structures of the leg. There are

many different conditions that can cause leg swelling, including: vein disease, blood clots, medications, kidney problems and heart failure.

- **Lymphedema** – buildup of fluid in the arms or legs after the network of vessels called the lymphatic system become damaged, resulting in swelling of the affected limb. It can happen in some people who have surgery or radiation treatment for cancer, as well as after an infection or injury to the limb, congenital abnormalities and underlying obesity.
- **Raynaud’s Disease** – This disease causes some areas of the body, such as fingers and toes to feel numb and cold in response to cold temperatures or stress. Treatment depends on its severity and whether you have other health conditions. For most people, Raynaud’s disease isn’t disabling, but it can affect your quality of life.
- **Chronic Venous Disease (CVD)** – a common disorder of the leg veins that carry blood back to the heart. It can cause mild to severe symptoms, including a feeling of leg heaviness or aching, swelling and skin changes.
- **Deep Vein Thrombosis (DVT)** – a blood clot that most commonly forms in the upper or lower extremities. It can result from orthopedic or major surgery, active cancer, or prolonged plane or car travel.
- **Inferior Vena Cava (IVC) Filter Placement and Removal** – a medical device that prevents blood clots from traveling from the legs (DVT) to the lungs (PE). This procedure is done under local anesthesia, and commonly performed when a patient cannot be placed on a blood thinner due to the risk of bleeding.
- **Lower Extremity Ulcers** – These open, non-healing sores on the legs, shin, or ankle can occur when someone has severe chronic venous disease. These ulcers can be very painful, ooze fluid, and take months to heal.
- **Pulmonary Embolism (PE)** – usually occurs when a blood clot from the leg travels to the lungs. The most common symptom is usually sudden or gradual shortness of breath. It can result from orthopedic or major surgery, active cancer, or prolonged plane or car travel.
- **Thrombosis (blood clots)** – a semisolid mass that forms when certain parts of the blood (platelets, proteins and cells) stick together and thicken the blood. Clotting is a helpful process that stops bleeding when it occurs at the site of injury and bleeding blood vessels. However, when it forms inside the blood vessel and compromises blood flow, it may lead to dangerous and life-threatening health issues.
- **Varicose Veins** – occur when your veins become swollen and twisted from underlying vein disease, which mainly affects veins in the legs.
- **Venous Thromboembolism** – a generic term for deep venous thrombosis (DVT) or pulmonary embolism (PE). Once one of these diagnoses are made it is important to take some form of blood thinner for a prescribed length of time.
- **Abdominal Aortic Aneurysms (AAA)** – manifested by swelling in the aorta, the main artery that carries blood from the heart to the abdomen. While most aneurysms do not cause any problems, they can be serious if they are at risk of rupturing. Treatment options include surgery and lifestyle changes, like blood pressure control and tobacco cessation.
- **Aortic Dissection** – tear in the layers of the wall of the aorta. Depending on the location of the dissection and the blockage of blood flow to other parts of the body, this type of aortic injury may be a surgical emergency or managed medically at first.

- **Aortic Vessel Disease** – one of the most common forms of cardiovascular disease. This broad range of conditions which may require treatment, includes aneurysms, tears in the inner lining and ulcers.
 - **Carotid Artery Disease** – occurs when fatty deposits, called plaques, clog the blood vessels that deliver blood to the brain and head (carotid arteries). The clog increases the risk of stroke, which is a medical emergency.
 - **Carotid Atherosclerosis** – occurs when fatty deposits, called plaques, clog the blood vessel that deliver blood to the brain and head (carotid arteries).
 - **Critical Limb Ischemia (CLI)** – A severe blockage in the arteries of the lower extremities, which markedly reduces blood-flow.
 - **Lower extremity ulcers** – These open, non-healing sores on the legs, shin or ankle can occur when someone has severe chronic venous disease. They can take be very painful, ooze fluid and take months to heal.
 - **Mesenteric ischemia** – Mesenteric ischemia occurs when narrowed or blocked arteries restrict blood flow to your small intestine. Decreased blood flow can permanently damage the small intestine and may require immediate surgery.
 - **Peripheral Arterial Disease (PAD)** – Peripheral arterial disease is the process in which plaque, also known as atherosclerosis, builds up in the arteries. PAD usually occurs in people who already have documented plaque buildup in other parts of the body. Other risk factors include diabetes, high cholesterol, tobacco use and family history of plaque buildup.
 - **Renal Artery Stenosis** – the narrowing of one or more arteries that carry blood to your kidneys (renal arteries). Reduced blood flow to your kidneys may injure kidney tissue and increase blood pressure throughout your body. Treatment options include lifestyle changes, medication and a procedure to restore blood flow to the kidneys.
 - **Thoracic Aortic Aneurysms (TAA)** – a dilation or swelling of the aorta in the chest. It is a serious medical condition due to the risk of rupturing, which is a medical emergency. Treatment options include surgery and lifestyle changes, like blood pressure control and tobacco cessation.
 - **Transient Ischemic Attack (TIA)/Stroke** – When the artery to the brain has plaque that enters the bloodstream or becomes completely blocked, it can cause a transient ischemic attack (TIA) or stroke. Symptoms include numbness, weakness or paralysis in the face, arm or leg, and trouble with speech and thinking.
 - **Vision loss** – There are two types of vision loss. Amaurosis fugax is sudden temporary loss of vision in one of your eyes. Homonymous hemianopsia is vision loss in both eyes on one side.

C – 3.5. OhioHealth Imaging and Radiology – OhioHealth offers access to advanced imaging technologies such as but not limited to:

C – 3.5.1. 3-D Digital Mammography – enables accurate and early detection of breast cancer and fewer diagnostic interventions.

C – 3.5.2. Open Magnetic Resonance Imaging – offers increase comfort and relaxing experience.

C – 3.5.3. Imaging and Radiology Services –

- **Bone Density** – consist of X rays to determine weight of calcium and other bone minerals into a segment of bone. The spine, hip, and forearm are often tested for bone density.
- **CT Scan** – consist of X-rays and a computer to create images of bones and soft tissues.
- **Fluoroscopy** – uses X ray beam pulses to take real time, moving images inside the body.
- **Interventional Radiology** – enables radiologists to perform minimally invasive procedures using radiologic imaging for guidance during procedures.
- **Digital Mammography** – enables visualization of the breast on the computer. OhioHealth offers 3D digital mammography, also known as breast tomosynthesis, to patients with dense breast tissue or history of breast cancer.
- **Breast Biopsy** – removal of breast tissue to check for signs of breast cancer.
- **Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI)** – utilizes a large magnet and radio waves to visualize organs and structures inside the body.
- **Nuclear Medicine** – a type of medical specialty that uses radioactive tracers to assess functions and diagnose and treat disease. Cameras allow doctors to track the radioactive tracers.
- **SPEC/CT** – a nuclear medicine technique that combines single photon emission computed tomography (SPEC) and computed tomography (CT).
- **PET/CT** – a nuclear medicine technique that combines positron emission tomography (PET) scanner and x-ray computed tomography (CT), in order to obtain sequential images in the same session and combined into a single image. The PET shows the spatial distribution of metabolic activities whereas CT shows anatomic imaging.
- **Vascular Ultrasound** – a noninvasive test that determines the blood flow in arteries and veins of the arms, neck and legs. A vascular ultrasound helps providers diagnose blood clots and peripheral artery disease.
- **Ultrasound** – an imaging test that uses sound waves to create pictures of organs, tissues and other structures of the body.
- **X-ray** – utilizes electromagnetic waves to create photos of the body in black and white. X rays may be used to determine broken bones, pneumonia, or screen for breast cancer.

C – 3.5.4. Laboratory services – OhioHealth has partnered with Quest Diagnostics to provide laboratory services for OhioHealth patients.

C – 3.5.5. Maternity Care – OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital is one of the nine OhioHealth hospitals that offer maternity care. Moreover, OhioHealth offers access to Maternal-Fetal Medicine specialists for patients with high-risk pregnancies. The team is comprised of ultrasound technologists, nurse clinicians, genetic counselors, and Maternal-Fetal Medicine doctors. If a patient was identified to have a high-risk pregnancy, OhioHealth collaborates with Nationwide Children’s Hospital to develop a maternity care plan for the mother and baby.

C – 3.5.6. Neuroscience – OhioHealth treats patients with brain and spine conditions with comprehensive neuroscience care that includes the following:

- **Acute care** – including a 224-bed world-class Neuroscience Center and five certified stroke centers throughout Ohio.
- **Outpatient clinics** – enables same day access to neurologists, neurosurgeons, psychologists, advanced practice providers, nurse practitioners, medical assistants, nurses, social workers, rehabilitation therapists.
- **Neurological rehabilitation** – facilitated by therapists to help patients regain vitality.
- **Wellness programs** – combine exercise, nutrition, education and support to increase quality of life and a one-of-a-kind Neuroscience Wellness Center.
- **Ongoing support and education** – offers patients and families access to support groups and art therapy.

OhioHealth Neuroscience Team has top quality programs and services, including:

- **OhioHealth ALS Clinic** – ALS stands for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, a neurodegenerative disorder that affects the brain and spinal cord nerve cells. OhioHealth provides patients and families with the highest level of ALS care through our multidisciplinary OhioHealth ALS Clinic. The ALS Association, along with the ALS United Ohio, recognizes OhioHealth as the only ALS-certified treatment center of excellence in the region.
 - The multidisciplinary ALS Clinic also brings our ALS specialists together in one location to meet the needs of patients in one visit. The clinic’s team includes physical, occupational, speech and respiratory therapists, as well as neurologists, social workers and registered nurses that proactively monitor and manage the symptoms of ALS patients.
 - The multidisciplinary team is comprised of fellowship-trained neurologist; occupational therapist; physical therapist; speech therapist; dietitian; social worker; respiratory therapist; registered nurse or care services coordinator with the ALS United Ohio.
- **OhioHealth Behavioral and Mental Health** – As a leader in Behavioral Health, OhioHealth provides inpatient and outpatient services throughout the Ohio region for patients with psychiatric disorders and their families.
 - **OhioHealth Inpatient care** – often recommended when the emotional, psychological and behavioral problems have reached a crisis, and the patient needs a safe environment to stabilize. As the crisis is addressed, the team assesses the need for follow-up outpatient care and puts a plan in place to support the patient’s continued recovery. Services include medication management, group therapy and activities, ECT, further consultation, and education. Inpatient care locations are available at (a) OhioHealth Riverside Methodist Hospital, 3535 Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214; (b) OhioHealth Marion General Hospital, 1000 McKinley Park Drive, Marion, Ohio 43302; and (c) OhioHealth Mansfield Hospital, 335 Glessner Avenue, Mansfield, Ohio 44903.
 - **OhioHealth Electroconvulsive therapy (ECT)** – a safe and effective treatment for some psychiatric disorders. ECT treats depression and other mood disorders, such as bipolar disorder. Before a patient receives their first treatment, they will create a treatment plan with their OhioHealth physician team to determine that ECT is the appropriate form of treatment. The total number of treatments needed to successfully treat severe depression will vary based on age, diagnosis, history of the illness, family support and response to treatment. Most people require six to twelve treatments and may notice a difference after two to four depending on the severity of their illness.
 - **OhioHealth Psychiatric Emergency Services** – A psychiatric assessment and evaluation is available to patients receiving care at OhioHealth Emergency Departments.

- **OhioHealth inpatient consultation/liaison services** – Physicians may request a psychiatric assessment and evaluation for medical patients with psychiatric complications who are currently receiving inpatient hospital care. A psychiatrist, advance practice nurse or LISW will evaluate the patient, make recommendations for treatment and follow the patient’s course of care until he/she is stabilized.
- **OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Service locations** –
 - + The **OhioHealth Outpatient Behavioral Health Offices-Central Ohio** is located at 3820 Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43214. This outpatient location offers patients with access to: (a) Partial Hospitalization Program and Intensive Outpatient Program; (b) Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio Rape Helpline; and (c) Mindfulness Based Stress Reduction Program.
 - + The **OhioHealth Marion General Hospital Behavioral Health** is located at 1000 McKinley Park Drive, Marion, Ohio 43302. This outpatient location offers patients with access to (a) Partial Hospitalization Program and Intensive Outpatient Program; and (b) Aftercare Program.
 - + The **OhioHealth Mansfield Hospital Behavioral Health** is located at 335 Glessner Avenue, Mansfield, Ohio 44903. This outpatient location offers patients with access to Intensive Outpatient Program.
 - + The **OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health** is located at 5141 West Broad Street, Suite 115, Columbus, Ohio 43228. This outpatient location offers patients with access to Partial Hospitalization Program and Intensive Outpatient Program.
 - + The **OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health Columbus West Lane Avenue Suite 230** is located at 1480 West Lane Avenue, Suite 230, Columbus, Ohio 43221. This outpatient behavioral health location provides comprehensive assessments and a plan of care for the cognitive and emotional effects of many neurologic conditions and psychiatric issues such as: Adolescent Psychiatry; Adult Counseling; Adult Psychiatry; Affective Disorders; Anger Management; Anxiety Disorders; Attention Deficit Disorder; Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder; Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder Evaluations; Bipolar Disorder; Cognitive Therapy; Depression; Dissociative Disorders; Electroconvulsive Therapy; Forensic Psychiatry; General Psychiatry; Geriatric Depression; Geriatric Post Traumatic Stress Disorder; Geriatric Psychiatry; Group Therapy; Liaison Psychiatry; Mental Retardation & Development Disabilities; Mood Disorders; Neurobehavior Disorders; Neuropsychiatric Disorders; Obsessive Compulsive Disorder; Oppositional Defiant Disorder; Panic Disorders; Personality Disorders; Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder; Psychosomatic Medicine; Refractory Psychiatric Disorder; Schizophrenia & Schizoaffective Disorder; and Substance Abuse Screening. It also offers neuropsychological testing and assessment prior to surgery or other procedures and interventions.
 - + The **OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health Marion** is located at 990 S. Prospect Street, Suite 3, Marion, Ohio 43302. This outpatient location provides behavioral health and neuropsychology testing and assessments similar to those of the OhioHealth Physician Group Behavioral Health clinic in Columbus, on West Lane Avenue.

- **Access to OhioHealth Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation Therapy (TMS) –** TMS Therapy uses highly focused magnetic pulses to stimulate the areas of the brain thought to control mood. The theory is that TMS Therapy causes neurons to become active, leading to the release of neurotransmitters to relieve symptoms of depression. Each outpatient treatment involves gentle placement of the magnetic coil against the patient's head. TMS Therapy utilizes a technology like Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) that has a long-term record of safety.
- **Access to OhioHealth Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP) –** The Partial Hospitalization Program is used either as a step down from inpatient care or to help prevent hospitalization for outpatients experiencing more acute symptoms. PHP is structured treatment in a group setting designed to treat adults with symptoms of depression, anxiety, and/or thought disorganization that are affecting their ability to function in multiple areas of their lives. The goal of this program is to stabilize the acute symptoms and help people return to more normal levels of functioning. Patients attend the program five days per week, up to six hours per day. Length of stay varies and is determined by individual needs.
- **Access to OhioHealth Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) –** The Intensive Outpatient Program may serve as a step down from inpatient care or Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP), or for outpatients needing more intensive care than office visits. Depression, anxiety, and/or thought disorganization are the symptoms addressed in the group treatment format. The focus is on helping patients better understand their diagnosis, manage symptoms, increase functioning, and prevent relapse. Patients attend three or four days per week for up to four hours per day. Length of stay varies and is determined by individual needs.
- **Access to OhioHealth Marion General Hospital's Aftercare Program –** OhioHealth Marion General Hospital offers two Aftercare Programs.
 - + The Wednesday, two-hour Aftercare group supports those in the community with severe, persistent mental illness by helping them manage symptoms and maintain / increase functioning in the community. Participants can join as many times as necessary.
 - + The Thursday, two-hour Aftercare group focuses primarily on relapse prevention. Patients often attend as a step down from our Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP) or Intensive Outpatient Programs (IOP). Attendance is limited to a maximum of 12 weeks.
- **Access to OhioHealth Behavioral Health Outpatient Consultation/Transition Services –** These services are for patients who are awaiting placement with an ongoing physician for their behavioral health needs or for consultation. This service only accepts referrals from within OhioHealth.
- **Access to OhioHealth Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio (SARNCO) Programs and Services –** SARNCO is a rape crisis intervention and prevention program providing advocacy and emotional support in conjunction with medical and social services at OhioHealth Emergency Departments and other facilities in central Ohio. SARNCO also provides community outreach and prevention. SARNCO's 24-Hour Rape Helpline is (614) 267-7020. OhioHealth also supports survivors across the state via the Ohio Sexual Violence Helpline at (844) OHIO-HELP. The OhioHealth Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio (SARNCO) also offers evidence collection examinations to survivors in local Emergency Departments.
- **Access to OhioHealth Mindfulness Program –** The Mindfulness program at OhioHealth is a highly-effective and extensively researched program offering relief from stress-related symptoms. In addition, the OhioHealth Mindfulness Program enhances well-being and peace of mind. OhioHealth offers an eight-week and abbreviated "short course" to help anyone who needs support coping with real life challenges such as anxiety, depression, stress, serious illnesses and other needs.

- **OhioHealth Cerebrovascular Care** – OhioHealth’s cerebrovascular care experts utilizes cutting-edge treatments and technologies to treat patients with stroke, aneurysm, or cerebrovascular abnormalities. Examples of OhioHealth’s interventions include:
 - Coiling, clipping, and gluing interventions for brain aneurysms.
 - + **Coiling** – OhioHealth uses coiling devices (as many as 500 different kinds) to block the flow of blood and prevent the aneurysm from rupturing. The minimally invasive treatment can also be used after an aneurysm rupture.
 - + **Clipping** – OhioHealth uses Integrated Cerebrovascular Fluorescence in aneurysm clipping, which is used to prevent leakage or rupturing of a blood vessel. The technique allows the surgeon to view cerebrovascular blood flow and immediately assess whether clipping of the aneurysm is complete or not.
 - + **Gluing** –OhioHealth uses Onyx® HD-500, a liquid embolic agent, to treat complex aneurysms. The minimally invasive treatment was granted a Humanitarian Device Exemption by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). At OhioHealth Riverside Methodist Hospital, OhioHealth’s interventional radiologists also use Onyx 18 and Onyx 34, which are FDA-approved for the treatment of vascular malformations.
 - Embolization for brain arteriovenous malformations and dural fistulas, which are poorly formed blood vessels.
 - Refracting nose bleeds.
 - Interventions for spinal vascular abnormalities.
 - Stenting of carotid artery disease in the neck and brain.
 - Stroke intervention.
 - Tumor embolization.
 - **Access to Neurointerventional Radiology** – uses minimally invasive image-guided procedures to diagnose and treat cerebrovascular, cardiovascular and peripheral vascular conditions without surgery. Interventional radiologists use fluoroscopy, CT scan, ultrasound, and MRI to guide tiny catheters and wires through the body’s vascular system to deliver treatment to specific areas of the body. Many conditions that once required open surgical procedures are now treated by interventional radiologists. This means less risk, less pain and less recovery time for patients.
- **OhioHealth Cognitive Neurology Care**

OhioHealth’s neurologists provide comprehensive assessment, diagnosis, and treatment for patients with common and rare complex dementia syndromes, also known as neurodegenerative conditions. Our approach to neurodegenerative care is one of compassion and dedicated expertise for every one of our patients and their families. OhioHealth neurologists spend the time required to diagnose individual patients, working step by step through their dementia symptoms and testing results. OhioHealth’s experts also consult with patients’ families to understand behavioral changes at home and at work.

 - Clinical Assessments and Imaging for Dementia.
 - Cognitive neurology assessment with a cognitive neurologist.
 - Comprehensive dementia evaluation.
 - Language evaluation.
 - Neuropsychological testing.

- Blood tests (to rule out reversible causes of memory loss, such as thyroid problems or vitamin deficiencies).
- Magnetic Resonance Imaging to look for patterns of atrophy or to rule out other causes of brain dysfunction, such as a tumor or stroke.
- FDG PET Scan to increase diagnostic accuracy regarding frontotemporal and Alzheimer's dementias. The FDG-PET scan stands for fludeoxyglucose-18 (FDG) positron emission tomography (PET).

OhioHealth neurologists treat primary neurodegenerative diseases that include:

- Mild cognitive impairment.
- Dementia of Alzheimer's type.
- Frontotemporal dementia.
- Dementia with Lewy bodies.
- Parkinson's disease dementia.
- Primary progressive aphasias (logopenic, semantic, agrammatic, apraxia of speech).
- Posterior cortical atrophy.

In addition, OhioHealth neurologists also treat and manage secondary cognitive dysfunction resulting from:

- Steroid-responsive autoimmune/paraneoplastic encephalopathy.
- NMDA encephalitis.
- Hepatic or renal failure related encephalopathy.
- Chronic sequelae of infectious encephalitis.
- Multiple sclerosis.
- Tumors.
- Epilepsy.
- Developmental delay - static brain injury.
- Strokes.

OhioHealth treatment of dementia syndromes include:

- Expert rehabilitative care with speech and physical therapists.
- Collaborative care with a patient's primary care physician.
- Continued assessment, as needed, by our cognitive neurologist.
- Social work assistance.
- Support group connections.

- **OhioHealth Orthopedic Care**

- Foot and ankle care.
- General orthopedic and fracture care.
- Treatment for patients with hand, wrist, and elbow pain.
- Non-surgical, minimally-invasive and surgical treatment options to tackle hip pain
- Access to joint replacement or arthroplasty.
- Care for knee conditions including sports injuries and total joint replacement.
- Access to treatment and management for arthritis that affects muscles, joints, and bones in the body that caused pain, swelling, and stiffness.
- Access to comprehensive, non-surgical, minimally invasive, and surgical treatment options for shoulder pain.
- Comprehensive spine care.
- Access to sports medicine care.
- Access to non-surgical orthopedic treatments such as physical therapy, regenerative therapy, and ultrasound-guided and fluoroscopically-guided injections.

C – 4.1. City of Delaware Parks and Recreation – manages parks, natural resources and recreation. The City of Delaware Parks and Recreation manages 24 parks, 20 miles of trails, golf course, and an urban forest of more than 15,000 trees. The City of Delaware Parks and Recreation is located at 500 E. Lincoln Avenue, Delaware, Ohio 43015 (City of Delaware, Ohio, n.d.).

C – 4.2. Delaware General Health District – examples of programs and services include:

- **Healthy and Active Living Basics** – provides key tips for living healthy lifestyles by providing tips on (a) eating healthy foods; (b) being sugar smart; (c) being physically active; and (d) quit smoking and limiting alcohol intake (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).
- **Stepping Up to Prevent Falls (SUTPF) Coalition** – aims to prevent injuries and deaths among older adults through evidence-based strategies to prevent falls, falls risk assessment, building systems for home assessment and changes, and access to mobility and balance trainings (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).
- **Minimize Risk, Maximize Life** – serves adults who would like to learn about reducing risk of problems related to alcohol use for self and their loved ones (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).

C – 4.6. Mount Carmel Fitness Center – The Mount Carmel Fitness Center is a medical fitness center that is part of the Mount Carmel Health System. It aims to promote health and wellness benefits for members and support preventative care. The Mount Carmel Fitness Center is a member of the Medical Fitness Association. The Mount Carmel Fitness Center offers the latest exercise programs, nutrition and health education, and medical fitness program. The facility offers access to the following: (a) full-service locker rooms; (b) indoor walking and jogging track; (c) nutrition planning; (d) lap pool; (e) warm-water therapy pool; (f) massage therapy; (g) group exercise studios; and (h) strength training equipment; and (i) cardio training equipment (Mount Carmel Health System, 2024). Examples of services that are offered at the Mount Carmel Fitness Center include:

- **MyFitRx® Medical Fitness Pathways** – aims to empower persons with chronic diseases improve their physical activity, manage their conditions, and avail of support from the fitness specialists. A referral is needed to participate in the MyFitRx®.
 - **Cancer Fitness** – helps cancer patients reduce fatigue, improve muscle function; and range of motion through guided movement.
 - **Cardiac Fitness** – guidance that aims to reduce risk factors for heart disease, improve strength, and enhance endurance.
 - **Cognitive Health** – features the utilization of exercise to improve mental cognition, mood, sleep, energy, reduce stress, and improve self-value and self-worth.
 - **Diabetes Fitness** – helps people manage their prediabetes, Type I and Type II diabetes through physical activity and healthy habits.
 - **Fit for Surgery** – helps people prepare for surgery by building muscle strength and endurance and stamina.
 - **Functional Fitness** – aims to reduce pain among persons with arthritis, fibromyalgia, lupus, multiple sclerosis, autoimmune disorders through gentle movement.
 - **Orthopedic Fitness** – features strength training in specific muscles after physical therapy.
 - **Pulmonary Fitness** – helps improve breathing, function of muscles, and tolerance of exercise.
 - **Transitional Care** – aims to motivate persons to improve endurance and health problems due to not being physically active.
 - **Weight Management** – helps participants set goals to achieve healthy weight and become physically active.
- **Personal Training** – supports persons who wanted to lose weight, build muscle, improve overall fitness. The team of personal trainers motivate, encourage, and empower accountability among participants. Benefits from availing an individual or group personal training are summarized below:
 - Become fit, strong, and flexible.
 - Maintain good posture, sense of balance, manage stress.
 - Improve heart health.
 - Reach or maintain a healthy weight.
 - Become motivated and overcome challenges to becoming fit.
 - Focus on health conditions such as arthritic pain, low back pain, diabetes, rehabilitation, and training during the perinatal period.
 - Learn exercise equipment use, cardio and free weight training.
 - Avail of an individualized program.

- **Group Exercise Classes** – Group fitness classes taught by a certified instructor that helps build emotional support and manage stress. Examples of group classes include yoga, Pilates, cycling, Zumba, Les Mills, dance, group strength, and pool aquatics.
- **BodyScript™** – utilized infrared technology to obtain data on the following: (a) body weight; (b) body water; (c) body fat; (d) essential fat; (e) reserve fat; (f) excess fat; (g) basal metabolic rate; (h) lean body mass; and (i) body mass index.
- **Volt Virtual Program** – a guided fitness platform that is accessible for free by members of the Mount Carmel Fitness Center. The participant and the fitness specialist can visualize workout results on real time. The fitness specialist is able to deliver an individualized fitness program to the participant.
- **Virtual Fitness Classes** – members have free access to virtual fitness classes powered by Move.
- **Les Mills Workout Classes** – helps participants become fit, lose fat, and develop body tone.
 - **Les Mills BODYPUMP™** – barbell total body workout with motivation and music.
 - **Les Mills BODYCOMBAT™** – high energy martial arts-inspired workout.
 - **Les Mills RPM™** – based on Cardio Peak Training, which combines steady state and high-intensity cardio endurance that burns fat.
 - **Les Mills Virtual Classes** – offers live instructor led virtual classes.
- **Remote health and fitness coaching** – powered by the Volt guided fitness platform. The health and fitness coaches are nationally certified and qualified to coach on topics such as strength training, functional training, managing weight, supporting lifestyle. Coaching may be done for each person or for partners.
- **Massage Therapy** – aims to provide renewal, relaxation, and managing pain. Massage therapy helps people with arthritis, sports injuries, fibromyalgia, shoulder pain, and low back pain. Examples of types of massage therapies provided by the Mount Carmel Fitness Center include: (a) Swedish massage; (b) Hot Stone Massage; (c) Myofascial Massage; (d) Sports Massage; and (e) prenatal massage.

C – 4.7. Preservation Parks of Delaware County – The Preservation Parks of Delaware County is comprised of more than 2000 acres of preserved area that are protected and conserved. The mission of Preservation Parks of Delaware County is “to protect and conserve the natural and historic features of Delaware County and to inspire outdoor exploration and learning” (Preservation Parks of Delaware County, 2024). The Preservation Parks of Delaware County offers the following activities to promote physical activity, relaxation, and mindfulness.

- **Group Hikes**
 - **Golden Marathon** – led by SourcePoint for persons ages 55 and up. The outdoor hiking has been done at (a) Char-Mar Ridge Park; (b) Deer Haven Park; (c) McCammon Creek Park; (d) Hickory Woods Park; (e) Shale Hollow Park; (f) Hogback Ridge Park; and (g) Blues Creek Park.
 - **Yoga and More** – offers hiking and yoga for people ages 15 and up. The outdoor hiking has been done at Deer Haven Park and Shale Hollow Park.
 - **Spooky Moon Hike** – hiking in the dark at Hickory Woods Park for all ages.
 - **New Year’s Day Hike** – hiking 1.5 mile gravel trail for all ages. New Year’s Day Hike has been done at Char-Mar Ridge Park and Glacier Ridge Trail.
 - **Winter Wildlife Tracks** – open for all ages. The Winter Wildlife Tracks purpose is to spot animal tracks in the snow and mud. Animal tracks of deer, fox, rabbits, and bird tracks. The Winter Wildlife Tracks is part of the one-mile loop trail at Shale Hollow Park.
 - **Owl Prowl** – evening hike to call owls and learn about their natural history.
- **FLEXtrail Free Local Exercise** – Stations are available at the trails at Char-Mar Ridge Preserve. The stations explain how to do various exercises without equipment. The stations give instructions on type of exercise, the primary and secondary muscles that are affected.
 - **Jump squat** – primary muscles include glutes, hip flexors, quadriceps, abs, calves, hamstrings.
 - **Jumping jacks** – primary muscles include glutes, hip flexors, quadriceps. Secondary muscles include abs, calves, hamstrings, and shoulders.
 - **Seated leg pull-ins** – primary muscles include abs Secondary muscles includes glutes and hip flexors.
 - **Lunge kicks** – primary muscles affected include glutes, hip flexors, and quadriceps. Secondary muscles include abs, calves, and hamstrings.
 - **Squats** – primary muscles affected include glutes, hip flexors, and quadriceps. Secondary muscles affected include abs, calves, and hamstrings.
 - **Bench triceps dips** – primary muscles affected include triceps. The secondary muscles affected include shoulders.
- **Mindfulness Trail** – available at Gallant Woods Park Pheasant Run Trail offers ways to practice mindfulness along the trail. Mindfulness allows people to focus on the present moment without judgment. The Mindfulness Trail is made possible through partnerships with Stark Parks, Delaware County Probate/Juvenile Court, and the Delaware-Morrow Mental Health and Recovery Services Board.
- **School and Community Outreach** – includes night hikes, live animal programs, and farm tours to agricultural heritage programs. Services are provided to the community at the Preservation Parks Outdoor Connections Department.
- **Winter 100** – Walking 11 miles or 100 kilometers together with a community of walkers.

C – 4.8. SourcePoint – provides in-home services, community programs onsite and offsite, and health and wellness programs for older adults and caregivers. OhioHealth is SourcePoint's 2014-2024 Health and Wellness partner (SourcePoint, 2024). SourcePoint aims to support seniors aged 55 and above to stay safely at home and avoid premature nursing home care. SourcePoint serves residents throughout Delaware County, including Ashley, Delaware, Galena, Kilbourne, Lewis Center, Ostrander, Powell, Radnor, Shawnee Hills, Sunbury. SourcePoint also serves parts of Columbus, Dublin, and Westerville that are within Delaware County jurisdiction.

Related to addressing health behaviors in Delaware County, SourcePoint offers access to the following:

- **SourcePoint's Enrichment Center** – enables social connection, stimulation, and physical well-being. SourcePoint's community center has a fitness center, exercise pool, Café 55, rooms for aerobics, art, billiards, dance, lectures, and music. SourcePoint's Enrichment Center offers free access to Delaware County residents aged 55 and older.
 - The Enrichment Center also offers participant's access to SilverSneakers®, Silver&Fit, and Optum Renew Active™ health programs.
- **SourcePoint's Falls Prevention** – offers home safety checks at no charge. SourcePoint also offers falls prevention curriculum and leads falls prevention coalition.
- **Falls-Free Zone curriculum** – provides education and exercise to help prevent falls.
- **Stepping Up to Prevent Falls Coalition** – community collaborative to increase availability of resources to prevent falls.
- **SourcePoint's Nutrition Services** – offers residents access to (a) Community Cafes, and (b) Farmers Market Vouchers.
 - **Community Cafes** – serve nutritious and delicious lunches on a donation basis for people aged 55 and older.
 - **Farmer's Market Vouchers** – provides vouchers for fresh foods from farmers markets and other vendors.
 - **Meals on Wheels provider** – part of SourcePoint's in-home care services.

D. How Data Was Obtained

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital collected the data from various sources as follows:

- D – 1.** The definition of the community served by OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital was developed by determining the percent of patients who resided in Delaware County during Fiscal Year 2022 and 2023, based on electronic medical records. See **Section A**.
- D – 2.** The demographic data of the Delaware County population was obtained from the Ohio Department of Development (n.d.). See **Section B**.
- D – 3.** Pertinent health data from Ohio's 2019 State Health Assessment and the 2022 Online State Health Assessment (Ohio Department of Health, 2022.). See **Appendix A**.
- D – 4.** Pertinent health and health-related data for Delaware County, Ohio versus State of Ohio, and United States (County Health Rankings, 2024; Ohio Department of Health, 2022); Ohio Department of Health (2023). See **Appendix B**.

No information gaps were identified that may impact the ability to assess health needs during the 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment process.

E. The Significant Health Needs of the Community

Delaware County stakeholders who participated in the 2022 Delaware County Community Health Assessments and the 2023-2028 Delaware County Community Health improvement Plan identified four priority health needs, namely (a) mental health and addiction; (b) community conditions; (c) access to care; and (d) health behaviors. **Table 4** shows the focus areas of these priority needs.

Table 5 shows the count of votes and alignment with the 2020-2022 Ohio's State Health Improvement Plan for each of the priority health needs in Delaware County.

G. The Process for Identifying and Prioritizing Community Health Needs and Services to Meet Community Health Needs

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital participated actively in the 2022 Delaware County Community Health Assessment and 2023-2028 Community Health Improvement Plan activities, planning, identification of significant health needs, voting, identification of priority health needs, and development of strategies to address the priority health needs in Delaware County.

In addition to the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital, the community stakeholders in Delaware County identified four priority health needs, namely: (a) mental health and addiction; (b) community conditions; (c) access to care; and (d) health behaviors.

The OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital's 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment and Fiscal Year 2026-2028 Implementation Strategy have used the priority health needs that were identified in the Delaware County Community Health Assessment. The OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital Implementation Strategy will include collaborations with various community partners based on the Delaware County Community Health Improvement Plan. Moreover, the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital's Implementation Strategy will also include continuing various OhioHealth clinical and community outreach programs that are applicable to address the priority health needs.

H. The Process for Consulting with Persons Representing the Community's Interests and Input Provided

Representatives from the OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital participated in activities related to the planning, conduct, and discussions of findings of the 2022 Delaware County Community Health Assessment. Moreover, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital also participated in developing the Delaware County Community Health Improvement Plan.

The process and steps that Delaware County took related to the 2022 Community Health Assessment (CHA) and 2023-2028 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) are briefly summarized in **Table 6** based on these two County reports.

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital developed its Fiscal Year 2026-2028 Implementation Strategy to address the priority health needs through continuations of collaborations with various community stakeholders in Delaware County, including the Partnership for a Healthy Delaware County. OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital's Implementation Strategy included various clinical and community outreach programs and services, in addition to further strengthening OhioHealth's extensive community partnerships in Delaware County.

Cancer Cases and Deaths in Ohio (2016-2020) – Cancer is the second leading cause of death in Ohio. Cancer accounts for 1 in 5 deaths in Ohio. Four out of 10 people in Ohio will be diagnosed with cancer during their lifetime.

New Invasive Cancer Cases in Delaware County (2016-2020) – On average, 992 new invasive cancer cases per year were diagnosed among Delaware County residents. The top 5 new invasive cancer cases in Delaware County were breast cancer (female); prostate cancer; lung and bronchus cancer; colon and rectum; and melanoma of the skin. These top five cancers represented 56% of all new invasive cancer cases. The cancer incidence rate (new cases) for all sites/types of cancer in Delaware County was lower compared to Ohio and United States rate. Males in Delaware County, Ohio and U.S. had slightly higher cancer incidence rates (based on new cancer cases) compared to females. Whites have higher cancer incidence rates compared to Blacks.

Cancer Deaths in Delaware County (2016-2020) – On average, 274 cancer deaths per year were diagnosed among Delaware County residents. The top 5 leading causes of cancer death in Delaware County were lung and bronchus cancer; colon and rectum cancer; pancreatic cancer; breast (female) cancer; and prostate cancer. These top 5 causes of cancer deaths represented 53% of all cancer deaths. The cancer death rate for all sites/types of cancer in Delaware County was lower compared to Ohio and United States rates. Males in Delaware County, Ohio and United States had higher cancer death rates compared to females. Cancer death rates among Blacks in Delaware County, Ohio and United States were slightly higher compared to Whites.

Collaborations on Addressing Mental Health and Addiction — As part of community-wide efforts, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital will continue to collaborate in offering community-based education that promotes positive mental health among youth and adults. This hospital action will be implemented through a stepwise approach:

- MHA-1.1.** Assist in gathering information on evidence-based education and/or trainings offered by agencies that provides mental health and addiction services in Delaware County.
- MHA-1.2.** Assist in conducting a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats (SWOT) analysis to determine gaps in services.
- MHA-1.3.** Assist in identifying up to three education programs that will be offered for free to Delaware County residents.
- MHA-1.4.** Assist in planning and developing a strategic promotion and engagement techniques to encourage community participation and reduce the stigma of mental health and addiction.
- MHA-1.5.** Participate in developing marketing tools that promote the educational offerings and participate in marketing the materials to churches, schools, civic clubs, law enforcement, chambers of commerce and local government.
- MHA-1.6.** Collaborate with the Delaware-Morrow Mental Health and Recovery Services Board and other community stakeholders in conducting the trainings.

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital's Impacts related to Collaborations on Addressing Mental Health and Addiction (MHA – 1).

MHA – 1.1. Community Access to the OhioHealth Rape Crisis Programs and Services

- **Access to 24-hour Emergency Room Advocacy** – Trained volunteer and staff advocates provide emotional support, crisis intervention and community resource information to survivors of sexual violence in local hospital emergency departments. In addition, SARNCO works with Deaf World Against Violence Everywhere (DWAVE) to provide advocacy to deaf survivors in the emergency department.
- **Forensic Nursing Program** – OhioHealth Forensic Nursing provides trained medical forensic care to survivors of sexual violence, felony domestic violence, human trafficking, child abuse/neglect, elder abuse/neglect, as well as child sexual abuse. Pediatric sexual assault exams are not performed at all OhioHealth hospitals.
- **24-Hour Sexual Assault Helpline** – Trained volunteer and staff advocates provide confidential emotional support, crisis intervention and community resource information over the phone to survivors of sexual violence, co-survivors, and the community. The 24-hour sexual assault helpline is 1-844-644-6435.
- **Sexual Violence Prevention Program** – The Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio (SARNCO) provides comprehensive prevention strategies, including training, education, policy review and outreach, for schools, campuses, and businesses. To reach a Prevention Coordinator for training or resources, the public could call (614) 286-5551.
- **Aftercare Advocacy** – This program provides support for survivors whose needs go beyond advocacy received in the emergency room or through a helpline. It empowers survivors and co-survivors to access community resources like reporting with law enforcement and safety planning. Survivors can call (614) 788-4739 to reach our Aftercare Advocacy coordinators.
- **Access to the Rape, Abuse, and Incest National Network (RAINN)** – people could call toll-free 1-800-656-HOPE (4673).

Collaborations on School-Based Suicide Awareness and Education — As part of community-wide efforts, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital will continue to collaborate in offering universal school-based suicide awareness and education programs. This hospital action will be implemented through a stepwise approach:

- MHA-2.1.** Assist in gathering information on middle schools and high schools that implements SOS Signs of Suicide program. SOS Signs of Suicide is an inexpensive, evidence-based suicide prevention program for middle and high school students.
- MHA-2.2.** Assist in creating a reporting system for tracking the number of students served by the programs.
- MHA-2.3.** Participate in developing a student referral and intake system.
- MHA-2.4.** Assess changes in youth mental health from the Youth Risk Behavior Survey.

This hospital action (MHA – 2) aligns with Ohio’s 2020-2022 State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP).

Appendix Table 32 shows the summary of the number of Delaware County patients, broken down by age groups, who had either a chief complaint of “suicidal” or “suicidal attempt” when they presented to the OhioHealth Emergency Departments. Table 32 shows that there was a decline of Delaware County residents ages 15 to 24 from 71 patients in Fiscal Year 2023 and 57 patients in Fiscal Year 2024. Similarly, there was also a decline in number of Delaware County residents ages 35 to 44, from 36 patients in Fiscal Year 2023 to 32 patients in Fiscal Year 2024. There was an increase in persons from Delaware County age 65 years and above, from 9 patients in Fiscal Year 2023 to 15 patients in Fiscal Year 2024.

Appendix Table 33 shows the summary of the number of Delaware County patients, broken down by age group, who had either primary diagnoses of “suicide attempt”, suicidal ideations”, “suicide”, or personal history of suicidal behavior, broken down by age groups. Table 33 shows that there was a decline of Delaware County residents ages 25 to 34 from 40 patients in Fiscal Year 2023 and 26 patients in Fiscal Year 2024. Similarly, there was also a decline in count of patients ages 35 to 44 with suicide risk from 32 patients in Fiscal Year 2023 to 26 patients in Fiscal year 2024. There was an increase in persons from Delaware County age 65 and above, from 13 patients in Fiscal Year 2023 to 18 patients in Fiscal Year 2024.

MHA-5. OhioHealth Behavioral Health Integration — As part of the community-wide efforts, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital will continue to screen patients for depression using either the two-item Patient Health Questionnaire or the nine-item Patient Health Questionnaire and refer patients to the OhioHealth Behavioral Team for consults and follow-up care.

This hospital action (**MHA – 5**) aligns with Ohio’s 2020-2022 State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP). Table 4 shows the details of the alignment with the SHIP.

OhioHealth Diabetes and Endocrinology Care** — As part of community-wide efforts, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital will continue to provide comprehensive diabetes and endocrinology healthcare services and make necessary recommendations and community referrals following the ADCES7 Self-Care Behaviors™ (Association of Diabetes Care and Education Specialists, 2021), which include:
- (a) **Healthy coping** — recognize one’s emotions and reduce the impact on pursuing self-care behaviors.
 - (b) **Healthy eating** — learning that diabetes does not stop you from eating your favorite foods but knowing that foods affect one’s blood sugar.
 - (c) **Being active** — learning how physical activity helps manage blood sugars, lowers cholesterol, improves blood pressure, helps manage anxiety, stress, and mood changes.
 - (d) **Monitoring of blood sugars** — gives objective information on managing diabetes, helps keep blood sugar on target, and helps make changes in food and activity.
 - (e) **Taking medication** — helps lower blood sugar, lowers risk of complications, and helps people feel better. Medications may include one type or a combination of insulin, pills that lower blood sugar, aspirin, medications for blood pressure and cholesterol regulation.
 - (f) **Problem solving** — develop skills to tackle unexpected situations related to diabetes management or tackling daily life activities.
 - (g) **Reducing risks** — understanding the risks of diabetes complications and lowering the chance of developing such complications. Examples of actions that reduce risks include regular medical check-ups, health checks, taking care of one’s feet, vaccinations, and other self-care actions.

MICH-2. Maternal and Infant/Child Health Collaborations — As part of community-wide collaborations, OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital will partner with the Delaware Public Health District and various community stakeholders to promote the health and wellbeing of children and their families. Actions will include the following:

- (a) Collaborate with the Delaware Public Health District and SAFE Delaware County Coalition in promoting traffic safety. The Delaware Public Health District provides education programs and community resources about injury prevention and traffic safety. Resources, tools, and campaigns focus on seat belt usage; child passenger safety; impaired driving; distracted driving; railroad crossing safety; pedestrian safety; bicycle safety; Safe Routes to School; Teen Driver safety; Safety Town; and community traffic safety advocacy (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).
- (b) Collaborate with the Delaware County Child Passenger Safety Program that provides services such as check car/booster seat installations; provide “car seat check-up events in neighborhoods; distribute free car/booster seats to qualifying residents; and provide child passenger safety education and training (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).
- (c) Collaborate with the Delaware County Healthcare Coalition in enabling a regional response to man-made or natural emergencies. Services include strengthening medical surge capacity; relationship building; open communication and sharing of resources; coordinating emergency preparedness skills and education (Delaware Public Health District)
- (d) Collaborate with the Tobacco-Free Delaware County Coalition in attaining a Delaware County tobacco-free community. Focus areas include prevention, education, and cessation programs; assistance to tobacco users in obtaining resources and support to quit; promotion of smoke-free and tobacco-free public places in Delaware County (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).
- (e) Assist in promoting awareness of the Delaware Public Health District’s school-based services, such as immunizations and flu shots and other clinic services and health education (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).
- (f) Collaborate with the Delaware Public Health District by referring mothers and their newborn to the Health Department’s prenatal and newborn home visiting programs, Women, Infants and Children (WIC), immunization program and Children with Medical Handicaps Program (Delaware General Health District 2021).
 - i. Prenatal home visits — available for free to all pregnant Delaware County residents. Each visit includes a check-up, information about community resources, and complimentary gifts for mother and baby.
 - ii. Newborn home visits — available for free to all Delaware County residents with newborns, including foster and adopted families. Families receive a complimentary bag of items for the newborn and Pack-N-Plays to those who qualify.
 - iii. Women, Infants and Children (WIC) — serves income-eligible pregnant, breastfeeding, and non-breastfeeding women, infants, and children up to five years of age, who have been identified to have a medical or nutritional risk. WIC services include nutrition and breastfeeding education; access to healthy foods; referral to healthcare providers, checks for height and weight and iron testing.
 - iv. Children with Medical Handicaps Program — serves children with special health care needs by referring them to healthcare providers, community and school services, agencies providing durable medical equipment, and other community resources that the child needs.

This hospital action (MICH-2) aligns with Ohio’s 2020-2022 State Health Improvement Plan. Table 10 shows details of alignment with the SHIP.

OhioHealth Grady Memorial Hospital's impacts related to collaborations and awareness of the Delaware Public Health District's maternal, infant and child health programs.

MICH – 2.2. School-Based Clinics

The Delaware Public Health District provides required immunization and seasonal flu shots for 7th and 12th graders. Children’s private insurance, Medicaid or Vaccines for Children are accepted.

MICH – 2.3. Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

The WIC services are available at the Delaware Public Health District’s offices (Delaware Public Health District, 2021):

- Delaware Office – located at 470 S. Sandusky Street, Delaware, Ohio 43015.
- Union Office – located at 940 London Avenue, Suite 1100, Marysville, Ohio 43040.
- Sunbury Office – served by a WIC mobile clinic.

WIC is a supplemental nutrition program for WIC, that provides nutrition and breastfeeding education. WIC also provides supplemental nutritious foods to income eligible pregnant, breastfeeding, and non-breastfeeding women, infants and children up to age 5.

Examples of WIC services include the following:

- Nutrition and breastfeeding education and support.
- Availability of nutritious foods like fruits, vegetables, peanut butter, eggs, milk, and cheese.
- Referral to health care providers and community programs.
- Screening for weight and height checks and hemoglobin testing.

MICH – 2.4. Newborn Home Visits

The Delaware Public Health District team provides Newborn Home Visits, that are characterized by:

- Available to all Delaware County residents with newborns, including adopted and foster families.
- Free of charge to Delaware County clients.
- The Delaware Public Health District’s registered nurse makes the home visits.
- Families receive a bag that has resources and items to help care for the baby.
- The Delaware Public Health District has partnership with Crib for Kids which enable availability of Pack n’ Plays.
- A newborn home visit involves the following: (a) certified lactation specialist (nurse) provides breastfeeding support; and (b) checkup of mom and newborn health.
- Weight check of baby.
- The registered nurse educates the mom and family about normal baby’s growth, safety, nutrition, and immunizations.
- The nurse makes referrals and linkage to services that are available in the community.
- Confidential and sensitive care.
- The mom and family have access to interpreter services.

MICH – 2.5. Car Seat Safety Program

The Delaware Public Health District collaborates with various car seat inspection stations throughout Delaware County. The collaborating agencies has Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians to provide car seat inspections for residents. The Agency technicians, partner with the Delaware Public Health District's Safety Staff in providing guidance and education related to the Car Seat Safety Program.

MICH – 2.6. SAFE Delaware County Coalition

The Delaware Public Health District leads the SAFE Delaware County Coalition. SAFE means Safety Awareness for Everyone. The Coalition aims to prevent accidental injury and death to persons from various age groups who reside in Delaware County by providing education and resources. The Coalition partners include law enforcement, hospital representatives, health care providers, fire departments, emergency medical personnel, schools, business and community agencies. The Coalition is supported and funded by Safe Kids Worldwide and the Ohio Traffic Safety Office/Safe Communities.

The SAFE Delaware County Coalition offers education, tools, and resources such as but not limited to:

- **Fatal crash review** – focuses on monitoring, reviewing, and determining measures to avert fatalities on Delaware County roadways due to traffic crashes (Delaware Public Health District 2021).
- **Child Passenger Safety** – focuses on efficient implementation of the Delaware County Car Seat Safety Program (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).
- **CarFit Program for safety of mature drivers** – collaborates with AARP and the American Occupational Therapy Association to ensure safety of older adult drivers. Delaware County residents have access to CarFit Virtual Workshops and CarFit On-Demand Workshops. Drivers who are older adults have greater chance of getting killed or seriously injured during a crash due to their fragile bodies. The Program also ensures that their cars are properly adjusted for them in addition to improving cognitive abilities and skills (AARP and AOTA, 2025).
- **Reduce Teen Crashes Delaware County, Ohio** – a program that awards efforts to promote teen traffic safety. The program's impact has shown the following: (a) 10 active schools; (b) 56 activities; (c) 107,740 students; and (d) 446 total submissions into the portal (Reduce Teen Crashes, 2019).
- **Seat Belt Usage** – the Delaware Public Health District collaborates with the Ohio State Highway Patrol and the Delaware Area Career Center to implement the Click It or Ticket Campaign. The campaign aims to promote awareness of the importance of wearing a seatbelt whilst operating a vehicle (Delaware Public Health District, 2024).
- **Education and awareness campaign about prevention of drug-impaired driving** – utilizes the tactics, messaging, and prevention awareness campaigns of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, such as but not limited to "If You Feel Different, You Drive Different", and "If You Feel Different, You Drive Different. Drive High, Get a DUI" (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.).

- **Education and awareness campaign about distracted driving** – utilizes the tactics, messaging, and prevention awareness campaigns of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, such as but not limited to “Don’t Drive Distracted. Eyes Forward” and “Put the Phone Away or Pay” (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.).
- **Safety promotion on railroad crossings and train tracks** – collaborates with the Operation Lifesaver® in the utilization and promotion of its Rail Safety Education. The goal is to reduce chance of collisions between people and vehicles and trains through education about rail safety (Operation Lifesaver, Inc., 2025).
- **Safety promotion of pedestrians** – utilizes the tactics, messaging, prevention, and pedestrian safety awareness campaign, and community resource guide of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.).
- **Bicycle safety** – utilizes the tactics, messaging, prevention, and pedestrian safety awareness campaign, and community resource guide of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.).
- **Prevention of speeding** – utilizes the tactics, messaging, prevention, and pedestrian safety awareness campaign, and community resource guide of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.). Examples of messaging include “Speeding Catches Up with You”, and “Speeding Slows You Down” (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.).
- **Promotion of motorcycle safety** – utilizes the tactics, messaging, prevention, and pedestrian safety awareness campaign, and community resource guide of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.). Examples of messaging include “Share the Road. Safety for all Road Users, and “Look for motorcyclists. Keep them safe.” (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.).
- **Promotion of First Responder Safety** – utilizes the tactics, messaging, prevention, and pedestrian safety awareness campaign, and community resource guide of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (U.S. Department of Transportation, n.d.). Examples of messaging include “Move Over. It’s the Law.”, “See Lights. Move Over. It’s the Law.”, “Move Over for Emergency Vehicles”.

MICH – 2.7. OhioHealth Partnership for a Healthy Delaware County (“The Partnership”) – The Partnership’s vision is to create a community where we work together to provide opportunities for complete health and wellbeing. The Partnership assesses community health and develops and implements an action plan to improve population health. The Partnership uses a community-driven strategic planning process to generate key health strategies. The Partnership is involved significantly with Community Health Assessment and Community Health Improvement Plan (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).

MICH – 2.8. Keep Delaware County Beautiful – promotes recycling and litter prevention through environmental education programs directed to the residents and businesses of Delaware County (Delaware Public Health District, 2021).

MICH – 2.9. OhioHealth Participation in Nurse Family Partnership – OhioHealth Community Health Partnerships has participated in the Nurse Family Partnership program through Nationwide Children’s Hospital’s The Center for Family Safety and Healing. The Nurse Family lives Partnership program is an evidenced-based program that has shown improvements in the health and quality of life of first-time moms and their children who lives in poverty (Nurse-Family Partnership Ohio, 2024).

OhioHealth nurses who provide services to first time-moms-to-be, starting in early pregnancy, until the child’s second birthday.

The Nurse-Family Partnership program has three goals:

- To help women avail of good preventive health practices and improve pregnancy outcomes.
- To help parents provide responsible and competent care and improve child health and development.
- To help parents develop a vision for their own future and improve parents’ vision for their own economic future.

Data for Ohio's Nurse Family Partnerships are summarized below:

- Every \$1 invested in Nurse Family Partnership saves \$5.90 in future costs for the highest-risk families who were served.
- The median age of moms at intake was 23 years old.
- 83% of moms were unmarried at intake to the program.
- 74% of moms enrolled in Medicaid at program intake.
- The annual median household income at intake was less than or equal to \$6,000.
- The race breakdown of moms served include: (a) 27% White; (b) 59% Black or African American; (c) 3% Asian; (d) 1% American Indian; (d) 0% Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander; (e) 6% multi-racial; and (f) 3% declined to identify their race.
- The ethnicity breakdown of moms served include: (a) 11% Hispanic; (b) 88% non-Hispanic; and (c) 1% Declined to identify their ethnicity.

Ohio's outcomes data from 1/1/2019 to 12/31/2021 were as follows:

- 86% of babies born at full term.
- 82% of mothers-initiated breastfeeding.
- 87% babies received all immunizations by 24 months.
- 51% of clients aged 18 years and above were employed at 24 months post-delivery.
